3	(Proposed by the House Committee on Rules

5	(Patron Prior to SubstituteSenator Lewis)
6	Continuing the Joint Subcommittee on Coastal Flooding. Report.
7	WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution 50 and Senate Joint Resolution 76 (2012) directed the
8	Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS) to study strategies for adaptation to prevent recurrent
9	flooding in Virginia's Tidewater and Eastern Shore localities; and
10	WHEREAS, the resulting VIMS report, titled "Recurrent Flooding Study for Tidewater Virginia,"
11	published as Senate Document 3 (2013), stated that recurrent flooding impacts all localities in Virginia's
12	coastal zone and is predicted to become worse over reasonable planning horizons (20 to 50 years); and
13	WHEREAS, VIMS offered several recommendations, including that the Commonwealth, working
14	with its coastal localities, (i) begin comprehensive and coordinated planning efforts; (ii) initiate
15	identification, collection, and analysis of data needed to support effective planning for response efforts;
16	and (iii) take a lead role in addressing recurrent flooding in Virginia for the following reasons: (a)
17	accessing relevant federal resources for planning and mitigation may be enhanced through state mediation,
18	(b) flooding problems are linked to water bodies and therefore often transcend locality boundaries, and
19	(c) prioritizing flood management actions must be based in part on risk, and therefore the Commonwealth
20	must oversee the necessary studies to determine adaptation strategies, as well as implementation of the
21	agreed-upon strategies; and
22	WHEREAS, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) study mandated by
23	House Joint Resolution 132 (2012) and presented on October 15, 2013, titled "Review of Disaster

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Preparedness Planning in Virginia," stated: "The state generally has strong disaster response plans, but

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27	WHEREAS, the JLARC study further noted that if four key assumptions in the state's current
28	evacuation plan do not hold, "timely hurricane evacuations could be compromised," placing citizens at
29	risk after the storm; and
30	WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution 16 and Senate Joint Resolution 3 (2014) established the Joint
31	Subcommittee to Formulate Recommendations to Address Recurrent Flooding as recommended by the
32	VIMS report; and
33	WHEREAS, the Joint Subcommittee to Address Recurrent Flooding met four times during the
34	2014 interim to collect information from federal and state agencies, localities, and stakeholders and to
35	carry out its work; and
36	WHEREAS, the Joint Subcommittee to Address Recurrent Flooding filed an executive summary
37	with the General Assembly prior to the 2015 Session, which included five initial recommendations to
38	increase public awareness, improve local and state government agency resiliency coordination, and
39	address floodplain management; and
40	WHEREAS, recommendations made by the Joint Subcommittee to Address Recurrent Flooding
41	during the 2014 interim resulted in six bills passing the General Assembly with bipartisan support during
42	the 2015 Session; and

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54	WHEREAS, pursuant to House Joint Resolution 26 and Senate Joint Resolution 19 (2018), the
55	Joint Subcommittee on Coastal Flooding continued its work during the 2018 and 2019 interims and
56	brought forth additional recommendations for the 2020 Session; and
57	WHEREAS, pursuant to House Joint Resolution 102 and Senate Joint Resolution 27 (2020), the
58	Joint Subcommittee on Coastal Flooding continued its work during the 2020 and 2021 interims and will
59	bring forth additional recommendations for the 2022 Session; and
60	WHEREAS, the members of the joint subcommittee concur that the work of the joint
61	subcommittee be continued for two additional years; now, therefore, be it
62	RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Joint Subcommittee on
63	Coastal Flooding be continued. The joint subcommittee shall have a total membership of 11 members that
64	shall consist of five members of the House of Delegates appointed by the Speaker of the House of
65	Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the
66	House of Delegates; three members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; and three
67	nonlegislative citizen members, one of whom shall be a business leader and one of whom shall be a
68	representative of the environmental community appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates, and
69	one of whom shall be a local official representing Virginia's flood-prone communities appointed by the
70	Senate Committee on Rules. Nonlegislative citizen members of the joint subcommittee shall be citizens
71	of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The current members appointed by the Speaker of the House of
72	Delegates shall be subject to reappointment. The current members appointed by the Senate Committee on
73	Rules shall continue to serve until replaced. Vacancies shall be filled by the original appointing authority.
74	Unless otherwise approved in writing by the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk,

75 nonlegislative citizen members shall only be reimbursed for travel originating and ending within the 76 Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of attending meetings. If a companion joint resolution of the 77 other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both Clerks shall be required. The joint subcommittee 78 shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership, who shall be members of the 79 General Assembly.

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In conducting its study, the joint subcommittee shall recommend short-term and long-term strategies for minimizing the impact of recurrent flooding and coastal storms.

Administrative staff support shall continue to be provided by the Office of the Clerk of the House of Delegates. Legal, research, policy analysis, and other services as requested by the joint subcommittee shall continue to be provided by the Division of Legislative Services. Technical assistance shall continue to be provided by faculty at Virginia institutions of higher education who have expertise in the subject matter. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the joint subcommittee for this study, upon request.

The joint subcommittee shall be limited to four meetings for the 2022 interim and four meetings for the 2023 interim, and the direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$18,640 for each year without approval as set out in this resolution. Approval for unbudgeted nonmember-related expenses shall require the written authorization of the chairman of the joint subcommittee and the respective Clerk. If a companion joint resolution of the other chamber is agreed to, written authorization of both Clerks shall be required.

No recommendation of the joint subcommittee shall be adopted if a majority of the House members or a majority of the Senate members appointed to the joint subcommittee (i) vote against the recommendation and (ii) vote for the recommendation to fail notwithstanding the majority vote of the joint subcommittee.

98 The joint subcommittee shall complete its meetings for the first year by November 30, 2022, and 99 for the second year by November 30, 2023, and the chairman shall submit to the Division of Legislative 100 Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and recommendations no later than the first day 101 of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for each year. Each executive summary shall state 102 whether the joint subcommittee intends to submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a report of 103 its findings and recommendations for publication as a House or Senate document. The executive 104 summaries and reports shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative 105 Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the 106 General Assembly's website.

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107 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint
108 Rules Committee. The Committee may approve or disapprove expenditures for this study, extend or delay
109 the period for the conduct of the study, or authorize additional meetings during the 2022 and 2023 interims.
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
