2	AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

6	A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-253.13:6, as it shall become effective, of the Code of Virginia,
7	relating to school boards; divisionwide literacy plans; contents; posting.
8	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
9	1. That § 22.1-253.13:6, as it shall become effective, of the Code of Virginia is amended and
10	reenacted as follows:
11	§ 22.1-253.13:6. (For effective date, see 2022 Acts, cc. 549, 550, cl. 2) Standard 6. Planning
12	and public involvement.
13	A. The Board of Education shall adopt a statewide comprehensive, unified, long-range plan based
14	on data collection, analysis, and evaluation. Such plan shall be developed with statewide participation.
15	The Board shall review the plan biennially and adopt any necessary revisions. The Board shall post the
16	plan on the Department of Education's website if practicable, and, in any case, shall make a hard copy of
17	such plan available for public inspection and copying.
18	This plan shall include the objectives of public education in Virginia, including strategies for first
19	improving student achievement, particularly the achievement of educationally at-risk students, then
20	maintaining high levels of student achievement; an assessment of the extent to which these objectives are
21	being achieved; a forecast of enrollment changes; and an assessment of the needs of public education in
22	the Commonwealth. In the annual report required by § 22.1-18, the Board shall include an analysis of the
23	extent to which these Standards of Quality have been achieved and the objectives of the statewide
24	comprehensive plan have been met. The Board shall also develop, consistent with, or as a part of, its
25	comprehensive plan, a detailed comprehensive, long-range plan to integrate educational technology into
26	the Standards of Learning and the curricula of the public schools in Virginia, including career and

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technical education programs. The Board shall review and approve the comprehensive plan foreducational technology and may require the revision of such plan as it deems necessary.

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29 B. Each local school board shall adopt a divisionwide comprehensive, unified, long-range plan 30 based on data collection, an analysis of the data, and how the data will be utilized to improve classroom 31 instruction and student achievement. The plan shall be developed with staff and community involvement 32 and shall include, or be consistent with, all other divisionwide plans required by state and federal laws and 33 regulations. Each local school board shall review the plan biennially and adopt any necessary revisions. 34 Prior to the adoption of any divisionwide comprehensive plan or revisions thereto, each local school board 35 shall post such plan or revisions on the division's Internet website if practicable, and, in any case, shall 36 make a hard copy of the plan or revisions available for public inspection and copying and shall conduct at 37 least one public hearing to solicit public comment on the divisionwide plan or revisions.

38 The divisionwide comprehensive plan shall include, but shall not be limited to, (i) the objectives 39 of the school division, including strategies for first improving student achievement, particularly the 40 achievement of educationally at-risk students, then maintaining high levels of student achievement; (ii) 41 an assessment of the extent to which these objectives are being achieved; (iii) a forecast of enrollment 42 changes; (iv) a plan for projecting and managing enrollment changes including consideration of the 43 consolidation of schools to provide for a more comprehensive and effective delivery of instructional 44 services to students and economies in school operations; (v) an evaluation of the appropriateness of 45 establishing regional programs and services in cooperation with neighboring school divisions; (vi) a plan 46 for implementing such regional programs and services when appropriate; (vii) a technology plan designed 47 to integrate educational technology into the instructional programs of the school division, including the **48** school division's career and technical education programs, consistent with, or as a part of, the 49 comprehensive technology plan for Virginia adopted by the Board of Education; (viii) an assessment of 50 the needs of the school division and evidence of community participation, including parental participation, 51 in the development of the plan; (ix) any corrective action plan required pursuant to § 22.1-253.13:3; and 52 (x) a plan for parent and family involvement to include building successful school and parent partnerships 53 that shall be developed with staff and community involvement, including participation by parents.

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54 The divisionwide comprehensive plan shall also include a divisionwide literacy plan for pre-55 kindergarten through grade three. The Board shall issue guidance on the contents of such plans. The 56 Department shall develop a template for such plans. Each divisionwide literacy plan shall follow such 57 template and address how the local school board will align (i) literacy professional development, (ii) core 58 reading and literacy curriculum, and (iii) screening, supplemental instruction, and interventions with 59 evidence-based literacy instruction practices aligned with science-based reading research and how the 60 school board will support parents to support the literacy development of their children. When developing 61 such divisionwide literacy plan, each local school board shall use programs from the lists developed by 62 the Department pursuant to subsection C of § 22.1-253.13:5 and subdivision H 2 of § 22.1-253.13:1 or 63 seek approval from the Department for the use of alternative programs that consist of evidence-based 64 literacy instruction and align with science-based reading research. Each such divisionwide literacy plan 65 shall be submitted to the Department and shall identify which core literacy curricula, supplemental instructional practices and programs, and intervention programs from the list developed by the Department 66 67 pursuant to subdivision H 2 of § 22.1-253.13:1 or alternative programs approved by the Department that 68 consist of evidence-based literacy instruction and align with science-based reading research will be used 69 in each grade level, kindergarten through 12, at each of the schools within such school division. Each local 70 school board shall post, maintain, and update as necessary on such school board's website a copy of its 71 divisionwide literacy plan and the job description and contact information for any reading specialist 72 employed by such school division pursuant to subsection G of § 22.1-253.13:2 and for any dyslexia 73 specialist employed by such school division The Department shall post each divisionwide literacy plan on 74 its website.

A report shall be presented by each school board to the public by November 1 of each oddnumbered year on the extent to which the objectives of the divisionwide comprehensive plan have been
met during the previous two school years.

78 C. Each public school shall also prepare a comprehensive, unified, long-range plan, which the79 relevant school board shall consider in the development of its divisionwide comprehensive plan.

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D. The Board of Education shall, in a timely manner, make available to local school boards
information about where current Virginia school laws, Board regulations and revisions, and copies of
relevant Opinions of the Attorney General of Virginia may be located online.

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
