AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the House Committee on Commerce and Energy

on _____)

(Patron Prior to Substitute--Senator Ebbin)

A BILL to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Title 59.1 a chapter numbered 56, consisting of sections numbered 59.1-593 through 59.1-602, relating to genetic data privacy; civil penalty.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 59.1 a chapter numbered 56, consisting of sections numbered 59.1-593 through 59.1-602, as follows:

CHAPTER 56.

GENETIC DATA PRIVACY.

§ 59.1-593. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

"Affirmative authorization" means an action that demonstrates an intentional decision by a consumer.

"Biological sample" means any material part of the human, discharge therefrom, or derivative thereof, such as tissue, blood, urine, or saliva, known to contain deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA).

"Consumer" means a natural person who is a resident of the Commonwealth.

"Deidentified data" means data that cannot be used to infer information about, or otherwise be linked to, a particular individual, provided that the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company (i) takes reasonable measures to ensure that such information cannot be associated with a consumer or household; (ii) publicly commits to maintain and use such information only in deidentified form and not to attempt to reidentify the information, except that the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company may attempt to reidentify the information solely for the purpose of determining whether its deidentification processes satisfy the requirements of this clause, provided that the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company does

27 not use or disclose any information reidentified in this process and destroys the reidentified information
28 upon completion of that assessment; and (iii) contractually obligates any recipients of the information to
29 take reasonable measures to ensure that the information cannot be associated with a consumer or
30 household and to commit to maintaining and using the information only in deidentified form and not to
31 reidentify the information.

32 "Direct-to-consumer genetic testing company" means an entity that (i) offers consumer-initiated
33 genetic testing products or services directly to a consumer or (ii) collects, uses, or analyzes genetic data
34 that is collected or derived from a direct-to-consumer genetic testing product or service and is directly
35 provided by a consumer. "Direct-to-consumer genetic testing company" does not include an entity when
36 such entity is only engaged in collecting, using, or analyzing genetic data or biological samples in the
37 context of research conducted in accordance with the (a) federal Common Rule, 45 C.F.R. Part 46; (b)
38 International Conference on Harmonization Good Clinical Practice Guideline; or (c) U.S. Food and Drug
39 Administration Policy for the Protection of Human Subjects, 21 C.F.R. Parts 50 and 56.

40 "Express consent" means a consumer's affirmative authorization to grant permission in response
41 to a clear, meaningful, and prominent notice regarding the collection, use, maintenance, or disclosure of
42 genetic data for a specific purpose.

43 "Genetic data" means any data, regardless of its format, that results from the analysis of a
44 biological sample from a consumer, or from another element enabling equivalent information to be
45 obtained, and concerns genetic material. Genetic material includes deoxyribonucleic acids (DNA),
46 ribonucleic acids (RNA), genes, chromosomes, alleles, genomes, alterations, or modifications to DNA or
47 RNA, and single nucleotide polymorphisms (SNPs). "Genetic data" includes uninterpreted data that
48 results from the analysis of the biological sample and any information extrapolated, derived, or inferred
49 therefrom. "Genetic data" does not include (i) deidentified data or (ii) data or a biological sample to the
50 extent that data or a biological sample is collected, used, maintained, and disclosed exclusively for
51 scientific research conducted by an investigator with an institution that holds an assurance with the U.S.
52 Department of Health and Human Services pursuant to 45 C.F.R. Part 46, in compliance with all applicable
53 federal and state laws and regulations for the protection of human subjects in research, including the

54 Common Rule pursuant to 45 C.F.R. Part 46, U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations pursuant to
55 21 C.F.R. Parts 50 and 56, and the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1232g.

56 "Genetic testing" means any laboratory test of a biological sample from a consumer for the purpose
57 of determining information concerning genetic material contained within the biological sample, or any
58 information extrapolated, derived, or inferred therefrom.

59 "Service provider" means a sole proprietorship, partnership, limited liability company,
60 corporation, association, or other legal entity that is organized or operated for the profit or financial benefit
61 of its shareholders or other owners that is involved in (i) the collection, transportation, and analysis of the
62 consumer's biological sample or extracted genetic material (a) on behalf of the direct-to-consumer genetic
63 testing company or (b) on behalf of any other company that collects, uses, maintains, or discloses genetic
64 data collected or derived from a direct-to-consumer genetic testing product or service or directly provided
65 by a consumer or (ii) the delivery of the results of the analysis of the biological sample or genetic material.

66 **§ 59.1-594. Exclusions.**

67 This chapter shall not apply to any of the following:

68 1. Protected health information that is collected, maintained, used, or disclosed by a covered entity
69 or business associate governed by the privacy, security, and data breach notification rules issued by the
70 U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164, established pursuant to the
71 federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, P.L. 104-191, and the federal Health
72 Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Title XIII of the federal American
73 Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, P.L. 111-5;

74 2. A covered entity governed by the privacy, security, and data breach notification rules issued by
75 the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164, established pursuant to
76 the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, P.L. 104-191, and the federal Health
77 Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Title XIII of the federal American
78 Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, P.L. 111-5, to the extent that the covered entity maintains, uses,
79 and discloses genetic data in the same manner as protected health information, as described in subdivision

80 1;

81 3. A business associate of a covered entity governed by the privacy, security, and data breach
82 notification rules issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and
83 164, established pursuant to the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, P.L.
84 104-191, and the federal Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Title XIII
85 of the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, P.L. 111-5, to the extent that the
86 business associate maintains, uses, and discloses genetic data in the same manner as protected health
87 information, as described in subdivision 1;

88 4. Scientific research or educational activities conducted by a public or private nonprofit institution
89 of higher education that holds an assurance with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services
90 pursuant to 45 C.F.R. Part 46, to the extent that such scientific research and educational activities comply
91 with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations for the protection of human subjects in research,
92 including the Common Rule pursuant to 45 C.F.R. Part 46, U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations
93 pursuant to 21 C.F.R. Parts 50 and 56, and the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20
94 U.S.C. § 1232g;

95 5. The newborn screening program established pursuant to Article 7 (§ 32.1-65 et seq.) of Chapter
96 2 of Title 32.1;

97 6. Tests conducted exclusively to diagnose whether an individual has a specific disease, to the
98 extent that all persons involved in the conduct of the test maintain, use, and disclose genetic data in the
99 same manner as protected health information, as described in subdivision 1; or

100 7. Genetic data used or maintained by an employer, or disclosed by an employee to an employer,
101 to the extent that the use, maintenance, or disclosure of such data is necessary to comply with a local,
102 state, or federal workplace health and safety ordinance, law, or regulation.

103 **§ 59.1-595. Information to be made available to consumers.**

104 A. Every direct-to-consumer genetic testing company shall provide to consumers:

105 1. A summary of the company's (i) policies and procedures related to the collection, use,
106 maintenance, retention, disclosure, transfer, deletion, and security of and access to genetic data and (ii)
107 privacy practices;

108 2. Information regarding the requirement for express consent for the collection, use, and disclosure
109 of genetic data and the process for revoking express consent pursuant to § 59.1-596;

110 3. Notice that a consumer's deidentified genetic or phenotypic data may be shared with or disclosed
111 to third parties for research purposes in accordance with 45 C.F.R. Part 46; and

112 4. Information about the process by which a consumer may file a complaint alleging a violation of
113 this chapter.

114 B. Information required to be made available pursuant to subsection A shall be written in plain
115 language and shall be provided to consumers together with any genetic testing product provided to
116 consumers. Such information shall also be included on any website maintained by the direct-to-consumer
117 genetic testing company in a manner that is easily accessible by the public.

118 **§ 59.1-596. Express consent required; revocation of express consent.**

119 A. Express consent required pursuant to this chapter requires a statement of the nature of the data
120 collection, use, maintenance, or disclosure for which express consent is sought in plain and prominent
121 language that an ordinary consumer would notice and understand and an affirmative authorization by the
122 consumer granting permission in response to such statement. Express consent shall not be inferred from
123 inaction.

124 B. Every direct-to-consumer genetic testing company shall obtain a consumer's express consent
125 for the collection, use, and disclosure of the consumer's genetic data, including, at a minimum, separate
126 and express consent for each of the following:

127 1. The use of genetic data collected through the genetic testing product or service offered to the
128 consumer. Express consent for such use of genetic data shall include a statement describing who will
129 receive access to the genetic data, how such genetic data will be shared, and the purposes for which such
130 data shall be collected, used, and disclosed;

131 2. The storage of a consumer's biological sample after the initial testing required by the consumer
132 has been completed;

133 3. Each use of genetic data or the biological sample beyond the primary purpose of the genetic
134 testing or service and inherent contextual uses;

135 4. Each transfer or disclosure of the consumer's genetic data or biological sample to a third party
136 other than a service provider, including the name of the third party to which the consumer's genetic data
137 or biological sample will be transferred or disclosed; and

138 5. Any marketing or facilitation of marketing to a consumer based on the consumer's genetic data
139 or marketing or facilitation of marketing by a third party based on the consumer's having ordered,
140 purchased, received, or used a genetic testing product or service, except that a direct-to-consumer genetic
141 testing company shall not be required to obtain a consumer's express consent to marketing to the consumer
142 on the company's own website or mobile application based on the consumer having ordered, purchased,
143 received, or used a genetic testing product or service from that company if (i) the advertisement does not
144 depend on any information specific to that consumer other than information regarding the product or
145 service that the consumer ordered, purchased, received, or used; (ii) the placement of the advertisement
146 does not result in disparate exposure to advertising content on the basis of the sex, race, color, religion,
147 ancestry, national origin, disability, medical condition, genetic data, marital status, sexual orientation,
148 citizenship, primary language, or immigration status of the consumer; and (iii) the advertisement of a
149 third-party product or service is clearly labeled as advertising content, is accompanied by the name of the
150 third party that has contributed to the placement of the advertisement, and, if applicable, indicates that the
151 advertised product or service and claims regarding the product or service have not been vetted or endorsed
152 by the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company.

153 C. Every direct-to-consumer genetic testing company shall provide a mechanism by which a
154 consumer may revoke express consent required pursuant to subsection B, which shall include an option
155 for revocation of express consent through the primary medium through which the company communicates
156 with consumers.

157 D. Revocation of express consent by a consumer shall comply with the requirements of 45 C.F.R.
158 Part 46. Upon revocation of express consent required pursuant to subsection B by a consumer, a direct-
159 to-consumer genetic testing company shall (i) honor such revocation of express consent as soon as is
160 practicable but in all cases within 30 days of receipt of such revocation and (ii) destroy the consumer's

161 biological sample within 30 days of receipt of revocation of the consumer's express consent to store such
162 sample.

163 **§ 59.1-597. Other requirements applicable to direct-to-consumer genetic testing companies.**

164 Every direct-to-consumer genetic testing company shall:

165 1. Implement and maintain reasonable security procedures and practices to protect a consumer's
166 genetic data against unauthorized access, destruction, use, modification, or disclosure; and

167 2. Develop procedures and practices to allow a consumer to easily (i) access the consumer's genetic
168 data; (ii) delete the consumer's genetic data, except any data required by state or federal law to be retained
169 by the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company and any account the consumer may have created with
170 the direct-to-consumer genetic testing company; and (iii) revoke express consent to storage of the
171 consumer's biological sample and request destruction of such biological sample.

172 **§ 59.1-598. Contracts with service providers.**

173 A. Every direct-to-consumer genetic testing company that enters into a contract with a service
174 provider shall prohibit the service provider from retaining, using, or disclosing the biological sample,
175 extracted genetic material, genetic data, or any information regarding the identity of the consumer,
176 including whether the consumer has solicited or received genetic testing, as applicable, for any purpose
177 other than for the specific purpose of performing the services specified in the contract with the service
178 provider for the business.

179 B. Every contract between a direct-to-consumer genetic testing company and a service provider
180 shall include:

181 1. A provision prohibiting the service provider from retaining, using, or disclosing the biological
182 sample, extracted genetic material, genetic data, or any information regarding the identity of the consumer,
183 including whether the consumer has solicited or received genetic testing, as applicable, for a commercial
184 purpose other than providing the services specified in the contract with the service provider with the
185 business; and

186 2. A provision prohibiting the service provider from associating or combining the biological
187 sample, extracted genetic material, genetic data, or any information regarding the identity of the consumer,

188 including whether the consumer has solicited or received genetic testing, as applicable, with information
189 the service provider has received from or on behalf of another person or has collected from its own
190 interaction with consumers or as required by law.

191 **§ 59.1-599. Certain disclosures of genetic data prohibited.**

192 No direct-to-consumer genetic testing company shall disclose a consumer's genetic data to any
193 entity that is responsible for administering or making decisions regarding health insurance, life insurance,
194 long-term care insurance, disability insurance, or employment or any entity that provides advice to such
195 an entity without the consumer's express consent.

196 **§ 59.1-600. Discrimination prohibited.**

197 No person or public entity shall discriminate against a consumer on the grounds that the consumer
198 has exercised any of the rights granted by this chapter with regard to:

- 199 1. Providing or denying any good, service, or benefit to the consumer;
- 200 2. Charging any different price or rate for any good or service provided to the consumer, including
201 through the use of discounts or other incentives or imposition of penalties;
- 202 3. Providing a different level or quality of goods, services, or benefits to the consumer;
- 203 4. Suggesting that the consumer will receive a different price or rate for goods, services, or benefits
204 or a different level or quality of goods, services, or benefits; or
- 205 5. Considering the consumer's exercise of rights pursuant to this chapter as a basis or suspicion of
206 criminal wrongdoing or unlawful conduct.

207 **§ 59.1-601. Enforcement; civil penalty.**

- 208 A. The Attorney General shall have exclusive authority to enforce the provisions of this chapter.
- 209 B. Whenever the Attorney General has reasonable cause to believe that any person has engaged
210 in, is engaging in, or is about to engage in any violation of this chapter, the Attorney General is empowered
211 to issue a civil investigative demand. The provisions of § 59.1-9.10 shall apply mutatis mutandis to civil
212 investigative demands issued pursuant to this subsection.
- 213 C. Notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, the Attorney General may cause an action to be
214 brought in the appropriate circuit court in the name of the Commonwealth to enjoin any violation of this

215 chapter. The circuit court having jurisdiction may enjoin such violation notwithstanding the existence of
216 an adequate remedy at law. In an action brought pursuant to this subsection, it shall not be necessary that
217 damages be proved.

218 D. Any person who violates the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to a civil penalty in an
219 amount not to exceed \$1,000 plus reasonable attorney fees, expenses, and court costs, as determined by
220 the court. Any person who willfully violates the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to a civil penalty
221 in an amount not less than \$1,000 and not more than \$10,000 plus reasonable attorney fees, expenses, and
222 court costs, as determined by the court. Such civil penalties shall be paid into the Literary Fund.

223 E. Each violation of this chapter shall constitute a separate violation and shall be subject to any
224 civil penalties imposed under this subsection.

225 **§ 59.1-602. Limitations.**

226 A. The provisions of this chapter shall not reduce a direct-to-consumer genetic testing company's
227 duties, obligations, requirements, or standards under any applicable state and federal laws for the
228 protection of privacy and security.

229 B. In the event of a conflict between the provisions of this chapter and any other provision of law,
230 the provisions of the law that afford the greatest protection for the right of privacy for consumers shall
231 control.

232 C. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to affect access to information made available to the
233 public by the consumer.

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
