6	A BILL to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Article 2 of Chapter 34 of Title 54.1 a section
7	numbered 54.1-3434.06, relating to pharmacies; centralized or remote processing of prescriptions;
8	prescription processing delays; work group.
9	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Article 2 of Chapter 34 of Title 54.1 a section
11	numbered 54.1-3434.06 as follows:
12	§ 54.1-3434.06. Centralized or remote processing of prescriptions.
13	A. A pharmacy may perform centralized or remote processing of prescriptions in accordance with
14	Board regulations.
15	B. Notwithstanding the provisions of § 54.1-3321, an employee registered as a pharmacy
16	technician in the Commonwealth may access the employer pharmacy's database from a remote location
17	for the purpose of performing duties of a pharmacy technician for centralized or remote processing of a
18	prescription as authorized by the Board, provided that the pharmacy establishes controls for protecting the
19	privacy and security of confidential records and provided that adequate remote supervision is provided by
20	a pharmacist licensed in the Commonwealth.
21	C. A pharmacy technician performing centralized or remote processing of a prescription in another
22	state on behalf of a pharmacy located in the Commonwealth shall hold registration in the Commonwealth
23	or licensure in compliance with the resident state and possess evidence that he has successfully passed a
24	national certification examination administered by the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board or the
25	National Healthcareer Association. A pharmacist licensed in the Commonwealth or in another state
26	wherein the remote processing of a prescription is being performed and who has satisfied licensure

27 requirements substantially comparable to the Commonwealth shall perform a check for accuracy of all
28 processing done remotely.

29 2. That the Board of Pharmacy (the Board) shall promulgate regulations authorizing a pharmacy 30 to outsource to a central fill pharmacy the performance of all tasks associated with dispensing a 31 prescription drug, including final verification for accuracy by a pharmacist, and alternate delivery 32 to the pharmacy that received the prescription. The regulations shall include an expanded 33 pharmacist-to-pharmacy technician ratio for a central fill pharmacy performing duties exclusive of 34 a central fill pharmacy that does not dispense drugs to patients in person and incorporates sufficient 35 technology to limit distractions to pharmacy personnel. Unless prohibited under federal law, the 36 transfer of the prescription shall not be required if the pharmacies share a common electronic file 37 or have technology that allows sufficient information necessary for dispensing the prescription. The 38 regulations shall include notification to the public of the service and verification of accuracy by a 39 pharmacist licensed in the Commonwealth or pharmacist licensed in another state practicing at a 40 central fill pharmacy holding registration as a nonresident pharmacy.

41 3. That the Board of Pharmacy (the Board) shall promulgate regulations related to prescription 42 processing delays that protect the health, safety, and welfare of patients. Such regulations shall 43 include provisions (i) addressing prescription backlogs with allowances for supply chain 44 interruptions and prior authorization delays; (ii) stating standards for timely processing of 45 prescriptions; (iii) stating standards for any corrective action plan detailing staffing, workflow, 46 technology, and patient communication strategies to address prescription backlogs; and (iv) 47 detailing enforcement remedies available to the Board. In developing its regulations, the Board shall **48** convene and consult with a work group comprised of chain and independent pharmacies, 49 pharmacist professional organizations, patient advocates, and other relevant stakeholders to 50 provide input on the development of the regulations.

4. That the Board of Pharmacy shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this act
to be effective within 280 days of its enactment.

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
