2	FLOOR AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE
3	(Proposed by Delegate Sullivan
4	on February 7, 2024)

6	Designating May, in 2024 and in each succeeding year, as Progressive Supranuclear Palsy Month of
7	Awareness in Virginia.
8	WHEREAS, progressive supranuclear palsy, also known as PSP, is a neurodegenerative disease
9	affecting the brain cells, particularly in areas that control mobility, balance, walking, speech, swallowing,
10	vision, behavior, and cognitive abilities; and
11	WHEREAS, while estimates vary and are often undercounted and misdiagnosed, more than 20,000
12	Americans are diagnosed with progressive supranuclear palsy in the United States; and
13	WHEREAS, on average, symptoms manifest after age 60 and can have a severe impact on an
14	individual's quality of life; and
15	WHEREAS, there is currently no known effective treatment, no known cure, and no known cause
16	of progressive supranuclear palsy; some symptoms may be managed with medication and care, but the
17	lack of understanding about the disease has often led to misdiagnosis, which has in turn caused significant
18	delays in proper intervention and hindered clinical trials; and
19	WHEREAS, the National Institutes of Health has made strides in the understanding and treatment
20	of progressive supranuclear palsy; and
21	WHEREAS, it is vital to continue supporting research on progressive supranuclear palsy, as people
22	with the disease can become severely disabled within three to five years of the first onset of symptoms;
23	and
24	WHEREAS, CurePSP is the leading nonprofit organization dedicated to raising awareness and
25	promoting care programs and cure research for progressive supranuclear palsy and two other
26	neurodegenerative diseases: corticobasal degeneration and multiple system atrophy; and

WHEREAS, in September 2023, United States Representative Jennifer Wexton, a friend and
former colleague who previously served in the Senate of Virginia, announced that she had been diagnosed
with progressive supranuclear palsy; and
WHEREAS, like many individuals with progressive supranuclear palsy, Congresswoman Wexton
was initially diagnosed with Parkinson's disease; she is courageously fighting the disease and has pledged
to amplify the voices of those suffering from progressive supranuclear palsy and to raise awareness of the
disease both among members of the public and in the health care community; and
WHEREAS, Progressive Supranuclear Palsy Month of Awareness provides an opportunity for all
Virginians to learn more about progressive supranuclear palsy and seek ways to support research into
treatment and cures or to provide hope and assistance to people living with the disease and their families;
now, therefore, be it
RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly
designate May, in 2024 and in each succeeding year, as Progressive Supranuclear Palsy Month of
Awareness in Virginia; and, be it
RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates transmit a copy of this
resolution to CurePSP so that members of the organization may be apprised of the sense of the General
Assembly of Virginia in this matter; and, be it
RESOLVED FINALLY, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates post the designation of this
month on the General Assembly's website.

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
