6	A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 22.1-199.1, 22.1-253.13:2, 22.1-299.2, and 51.1-617 of the Code of
7	Virginia, relating to elementary and secondary education achievement.
8	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
9	1. That §§ 22.1-199.1, 22.1-253.13:2, 22.1-299.2, and 51.1-617 of the Code of Virginia are amended
10	and reenacted as follows:
11	§ 22.1-199.1. Programs designed to promote educational opportunities.
12	A. The General Assembly finds that Virginia educational research supports the conclusion that
13	poor children are more at risk of educational failure than children from more affluent homes and that
14	reduced pupil/teacher ratios and class sizes result in improved academic performance among young
15	children; to this end, the General Assembly establishes a long-term goal of reducing pupil/teacher ratios
16	and class sizes for grades K through three in those schools in the Commonwealth with high or moderate
17	concentrations of at-risk students.
18	With such funds as are provided in the appropriation act for this purpose, there is hereby
19	established the statewide voluntary pupil/teacher ratio and class size reduction program for the purpose of
20	reaching the long-term goal of statewide voluntary pupil/teacher ratio and class size reductions for grades
21	K through three in schools with high or moderate concentrations of at-risk students, consistent with the
22	provisions provided in the appropriation act.
23	In order to facilitate these primary grade ratio and class size reductions, the Department shall

calculate the state funding of these voluntary ratio and class size reductions based on the incremental cost
of providing the lower class sizes according to the greater of the division average per-pupil cost of all
divisions or the actual division per-pupil cost. Localities shall provide matching funds for these voluntary

ratio and class size reductions based on the composite index of local ability to pay. School divisions shall
notify the Department of their intention to implement the reduced ratios and class sizes in one or more of
their qualifying schools by August 1 of each year. By March 31 of each year, school divisions shall
forward data substantiating that each participating school has a complying pupil/teacher ratio.

In developing each proposed biennium budget for public education, the Board shall include
 funding for these ratios and class sizes. These ratios and class sizes shall be included in the annual budget
 for public education.

B. The General Assembly finds that educational technology is one of the most important components, along with highly skilled teachers, in ensuring the delivery of quality public school education throughout the Commonwealth. Therefore, the Board shall strive to incorporate technological studies within the teaching of all disciplines. Further, the General Assembly notes that educational technology can only be successful if teachers and administrators are provided adequate training and assistance. To this end, the following program is established.

With such funds as are appropriated for this purpose, the Board shall award to the several school
divisions grants for expanded access to educational technology. Funding for educational technology
training for instructional personnel shall be provided as set forth in the appropriation act.

Funds for improving the quality and capacity of educational technology shall also be provided as set forth in the appropriation act, including (i) funds for providing a technology resource assistant to serve every elementary school in this Commonwealth and (ii) funds to maintain the currency of career and technical education programs. Any local school board accepting funds to hire technology resource assistants or maintain currency of career and technical education programs shall commit to providing the required matching funds, based on the composite index of local ability to pay.

Each qualifying school board shall establish an individualized technology plan, which shall be
approved by the Superintendent, for integrating technology into the classroom and into schoolwide
instructional programs, including career and technical education programs. The first priority for funding
shall be consistent with those components of the Board's revised six-year technology plan that focus on
(i) retrofitting and upgrading existing school buildings to efficiently use educational technology; (ii)

54 providing (a) one network-ready multimedia microcomputer for each classroom, (b) a five-to-one ratio of 55 pupils to network-ready microcomputers, (c) graphing calculators and relevant scientific probes/sensors 56 as required by the Standards of Learning, and (d) training and professional development on available 57 technologies and software to all levels and positions, including professional development for personnel 58 delivering career and technical education at all levels and positions; and (iii) assisting school divisions in 59 developing integrated voice-, video-, and data-connectivity to local, national and international resources.

60 This funding may be used to implement a local school division's long-range technology plan, at
61 the discretion of the relevant school board, if the local plan meets or exceeds the goals and standards of
62 the Board's revised six-year technology plan and has been approved by the Superintendent.

63 The Department of Education, the Department of General Services, and the Virginia Information
64 Technologies Agency shall coordinate master contracts for the purchase by local school boards of the
65 aforementioned educational technologies and reference materials.

66 A technology replacement program shall be, with such funds as may be appropriated for this 67 purpose, implemented to replace obsolete educational hardware and software. As provided in subsection 68 D of § 22.1-129, school boards may donate obsolete educational technology hardware and software that 69 are being replaced. Any such donations shall be offered to other school divisions and to preschool 70 programs in the Commonwealth or to public school students as provided in guidelines to be promulgated 71 by the Board. Such guidelines shall include criteria for determining student eligibility and need, a reporting 72 system for the compilation of information concerning the number and socioeconomic characteristics of 73 recipient students, and notification of parents of the availability of such donations of obsolete educational 74 hardware and software.

75 C. The General Assembly finds that local autonomy in making decisions on local educational 76 needs and priorities results in effective grassroots efforts to improve education in the Commonwealth's 77 public schools only when coupled with sufficient state funding; to this end, the following block grant 78 program is hereby established. With such funds as are provided in the appropriation act, the Department 79 shall distribute block grants to localities to enable compliance with the Commonwealth's requirements for 80 school divisions in effect on January 1, 1995. Therefore, for the purpose of such compliance, the block

81 grant herein established shall consist of a sum equal to the amount appropriated in the appropriation act 82 for the covered programs, including the at risk add on program; dropout prevention, specifically Project 83 YES: Project Discovery; English as a second language programs, including programs for overage, 84 nonschooled students; Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID); the Homework Assistance 85 Program; programs initiated under the Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program, except that such funds 86 shall not be used to pay any expenses of participating students at institutions of higher education; and 87 school/community health centers. Each school board may use any funds received through the block grant 88 to implement the covered programs and other programs designed to save the Commonwealth's children 89 from educational failure.

D.-In order to reduce pupil/teacher ratios and class sizes in elementary schools, from such funds
as may be appropriated for this purpose, each school board may employ additional classroom teachers,
remedial teachers, and reading specialists for each of its elementary schools over the requirements of the
Standards of Quality. State and local funding for such additional classroom teachers, remedial teachers,
and reading specialists shall be apportioned as provided in the appropriation act.

95 E.-D. Pursuant to a turnaround specialist program administered by the Department, local school
96 boards may enter into agreements with individuals to be employed as turnaround specialists to address
97 those conditions at the school that may impede educational progress and effectiveness and academic
98 success. Local school boards may offer such turnaround specialists or other administrative personnel
99 incentives such as increased compensation, improved retirement benefits in accordance with Chapter 6.2
100 (§ 51.1-617 et seq.) of Title 51.1, increased deferred compensation in accordance with § 51.1-603,
101 relocation expenses, bonuses, and other incentives as may be determined by the board.

102 F.-E. The General Assembly finds that certain schools have particular difficulty hiring teachers for
 103 certain subject areas and that the need for such teachers in these schools is particularly strong. Accordingly
 104 in an effort to attract and retain high quality teachers, local school boards may offer instructional personnel
 105 serving in such schools as a member of a middle school teacher corps administered by the Department
 106 incentives such as increased compensation, improved retirement benefits in accordance with Chapter 6.2

107 (§ 51.1-617 et seq.) of Title 51.1, increased deferred compensation in accordance with § 51.1-603,
108 relocation expenses, bonuses, and other incentives as may be determined by the board.

109 For purposes of this subsection, "middle school teacher corps" means licensed instructional 110 personnel who are assigned to a local school division to teach in a subject matter in grades six, seven, or 111 eight where there is a critical need, as determined by the Department. The contract between such persons 112 and the relevant local school board shall specify that the contract is for service in the middle school teacher 113 corps.

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§ 22.1-253.13:2. Standard 2. Instructional, administrative, and support personnel.

A. The Board shall establish requirements for the licensing of teachers, principals, superintendents,and other professional personnel.

B. School boards shall employ licensed instructional personnel qualified in the relevant subjectareas.

119 C. Each school board shall assign licensed instructional personnel in a manner that produces 120 divisionwide ratios of students in average daily membership to full-time equivalent teaching positions, 121 excluding special education teachers, principals, assistant principals, school counselors or certain other 122 licensed individuals as set forth in subdivision H 4, and librarians, that are not greater than the following 123 ratios: (i) 24 to one in kindergarten with no class being larger than 29 students; if the average daily 124 membership in any kindergarten class exceeds 24 pupils, a full-time teacher's aide shall be assigned to the 125 class; (ii) 24 to one in grades one, two, and three with no class being larger than 30 students; (iii) 25 to 126 one in grades four through six with no class being larger than 35 students; and (iv) 24 to one in English 127 classes in grades six through 12. After September 30 of any school year, anytime the number of students 128 in a class exceeds the class size limit established by this subsection, the local school division shall notify 129 the parent of each student in such class of such fact no later than 10 days after the date on which the class 130 exceeded the class size limit. Such notification shall state the reason that the class size exceeds the class 131 size limit and describe the measures that the local school division will take to reduce the class size to 132 comply with this subsection.

Within its regulations governing special education programs, the Board shall seek to set
pupil/teacher ratios for pupils with intellectual disability that do not exceed the pupil/teacher ratios for
self-contained classes for pupils with specific learning disabilities.

Further, school boards shall assign instructional personnel in a manner that produces schoolwide
ratios of students in average daily memberships to full-time equivalent teaching positions of 21 to one in
middle schools and high schools. School divisions shall provide all middle and high school teachers with
one planning period per day or the equivalent, unencumbered of any teaching or supervisory duties.

D. Each local school board shall employ with state and local basic, special education, gifted, and
career and technical education funds a minimum number of licensed, full-time equivalent instructional
personnel for each 1,000 students in average daily membership (ADM) as set forth in the appropriation
act.

E. In addition to the positions supported by basic aid and in support of regular school year programs of prevention, intervention, and remediation, state funding, pursuant to the appropriation act, shall be provided to fund certain full-time equivalent instructional positions for each 1,000 students in grades K through 12 who are identified as needing prevention, intervention, and remediation services. State funding for prevention, intervention, and remediation programs provided pursuant to this subsection and the appropriation act may be used to support programs for educationally at-risk students as identified by the local school boards.

To provide algebra readiness intervention services required by § 22.1-253.13:1, school divisions may employ mathematics teacher specialists to provide the required algebra readiness intervention services. School divisions using the Standards of Learning Algebra Readiness Initiative funding in this manner shall only employ instructional personnel licensed by the Board.

F. In addition to the positions supported by basic aid and those in support of regular school year programs of prevention, intervention, and remediation, state funding, pursuant to the general appropriation act, shall be provided to support (i) 18.5 full-time equivalent instructional positions in the 2020-2021 school year for each 1,000 students identified as having limited English proficiency and (ii) 20 full-time equivalent instructional positions in the 2021-2022 school year and thereafter for each 1,000 students

identified as having limited English proficiency, which positions may include dual language teachers whoprovide instruction in English and in a second language.

162 To provide flexibility in the instruction of English language learners who have limited English 163 proficiency and who are at risk of not meeting state accountability standards, school divisions may use 164 state and local funds from the Standards of Quality Prevention, Intervention, and Remediation account to 165 employ additional English language learner teachers or dual language teachers to provide instruction to 166 identified limited English proficiency students. Using these funds in this manner is intended to supplement 167 the instructional services provided in this section. School divisions using the SOQ Prevention, 168 Intervention, and Remediation funds in this manner shall employ only instructional personnel licensed by 169 the Board.

170 G. In addition to the full-time equivalent positions required elsewhere in this section, each local 171 school board shall employ one reading specialist for each 550 students in kindergarten through grade five 172 and one reading specialist for each 1,100 students in grades six through eight. Each such reading specialist 173 shall have training in science-based reading research and evidence-based literacy instruction practices. In 174 addition, each such reading specialist shall have training in the identification of and the appropriate 175 interventions, accommodations, and teaching techniques for students with dyslexia or a related disorder 176 and shall serve as an advisor on dyslexia and related disorders. Such reading specialist shall have an 177 understanding of the definition of dyslexia and a working knowledge of (i) techniques to help a student 178 on the continuum of skills with dyslexia; (ii) dyslexia characteristics that may manifest at different ages 179 and grade levels; (iii) the basic foundation of the keys to reading, including multisensory, explicit, 180 systemic, and structured reading instruction; and (iv) appropriate interventions, accommodations, and 181 assistive technology supports for students with dyslexia.

To provide reading intervention services required by § 22.1-253.13:1, school divisions may employ reading specialists to provide the required reading intervention services. School divisions using the Early Reading Intervention Initiative funds in this manner shall employ only instructional personnel licensed by the Board. Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of reading specialists to meet this staffing standard may assign reading specialists to grade levels according to grade levels with

187 greatest need, regardless of the individual staffing standards established for grades kindergarten through188 five and six through eight.

189 H. Each local school board shall employ, at a minimum, the following full-time equivalent190 positions for any school that reports fall membership, according to student enrollment:

191 1. Principals, one full-time in each elementary school, middle school, and high school, to be192 employed on a 12-month basis;

2. Assistant principals in elementary schools, one half-time at 600 students, one full-time at 900
students; assistant principals in middle schools, one full-time for each 600 students; assistant principals in
high schools, one full-time for each 600 students; and school divisions that employ a sufficient number of
assistant principals to meet this staffing requirement may assign assistant principals to schools within the
division according to the area of greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle,
or secondary;

3. Librarians in elementary schools, one part-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students;
librarians in middle schools, one-half time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students, two full-time at 1,000 students; librarians in high schools, one half-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students, two
full-time at 1,000 students. Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of librarians to meet
this staffing requirement may assign librarians to schools within the division according to the area of
greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle, or secondary; and

205 4. School counselors, one full-time equivalent position per 325 students in grades kindergarten206 through 12.

However, in order to meet the staffing requirements set forth in this subdivision, any local school board (i) may employ, under a provisional license issued by the Department for three school years with an allowance for an additional two-year extension with the approval of the division superintendent, any professional counselor licensed by the Board of Counseling, clinical social worker licensed by the Board of Social Work, psychologist licensed by the Board of Psychology, or other licensed counseling professional with appropriate experience and training, provided that any such individual makes progress toward completing the requirements for full licensure as a school counselor during such period of

214 employment or (ii) in the event that the school board does not receive any application from a licensed 215 school counselor, professional counselor, clinical social worker, or psychologist or another licensed 216 counseling professional with appropriate experience and training to fill a school counselor vacancy in the 217 school division, may enter into an annual contract with another entity for the provision of school 218 counseling services by a licensed professional counselor, clinical social worker, or psychologist or another 219 licensed counseling professional with appropriate experience and training. Local school boards that 220 employ a sufficient number of individuals to meet the staffing requirements set forth in this subdivision 221 may assign such individuals to schools within the division according to the area of greatest need, 222 regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle, or high schools.

I. Local school boards shall employ five full-time equivalent positions per 1,000 students in gradeskindergarten through five to serve as elementary resource teachers in art, music, and physical education.

J. Local school boards shall employ two full-time equivalent positions per 1,000 students in grades
 kindergarten through 12, one to provide technology support and one to serve as an instructional technology
 resource teacher.

To provide flexibility, school divisions may use the state and local funds for instructional technology resource teachers to employ a data coordinator position, an instructional technology resource teacher position, or a data coordinator/instructional resource teacher blended position. The data coordinator position is intended to serve as a resource to principals and classroom teachers in the area of data analysis and interpretation for instructional and school improvement purposes, as well as for overall data management and administration of state assessments. School divisions using these funds in this manner shall employ only instructional personnel licensed by the Board.

K. Local school boards may employ additional positions that exceed these minimal staffing
 requirements. These additional positions may include, but are not limited to, those funded through the
 state's incentive and categorical programs as set forth in the appropriation act.

L. A combined school, such as kindergarten through 12, shall meet at all grade levels the staffing
requirements for the highest grade level in that school; this requirement shall apply to all staff, except for
school counselors or certain other licensed individuals as set forth in subdivision H 4, and shall be based

on the school's total enrollment. The Board may grant waivers from these staffing levels upon request
from local school boards seeking to implement experimental or innovative programs that are not consistent
with these staffing levels.

244 M. School boards shall, however, annually, on or before December 31, report to the public (i) the 245 actual pupil/teacher ratios in elementary school classrooms in the local school division by school for the 246 current school year; and (ii) the actual pupil/teacher ratios in middle school and high school in the local 247 school division by school for the current school year. Actual pupil/teacher ratios shall include only the 248 teachers who teach the grade and class on a full-time basis and shall exclude resource personnel. School 249 boards shall report pupil/teacher ratios that include resource teachers in the same annual report. Any 250 classes funded through the voluntary kindergarten through third grade class size reduction program shall 251 be identified as such classes. Any classes having waivers to exceed the requirements of this subsection 252 shall also be identified. Schools shall be identified; however, the data shall be compiled in a manner to 253 ensure the confidentiality of all teacher and pupil identities.

254 N. Students enrolled in a public school on a less than full-time basis shall be counted in ADM in 255 the relevant school division. Students who are either (i) enrolled in a nonpublic school or (ii) receiving 256 home instruction pursuant to § 22.1-254.1, and who are enrolled in public school on a less than full-time 257 basis in any mathematics, science, English, history, social science, career and technical education, fine 258 arts, foreign language, or health education or physical education course shall be counted in the ADM in 259 the relevant school division on a pro rata basis as provided in the appropriation act. Each such course 260 enrollment by such students shall be counted as 0.25 in the ADM; however, no such nonpublic or home 261 school student shall be counted as more than one-half a student for purposes of such pro rata calculation. 262 Such calculation shall not include enrollments of such students in any other public school courses.

O. Each school board shall provide at least three specialized student support positions per 1,000
students. For purposes of this subsection, specialized student support positions include school social
workers, school psychologists, school nurses, licensed behavior analysts, licensed assistant behavior
analysts, and other licensed health and behavioral positions, which may either be employed by the school
board or provided through contracted services.

In order to fill vacant school psychologist positions, any local school board may employ, under a provisional license issued by the Department for three school years with an allowance for an additional two-year extension with the approval of the division superintendent, clinical psychologists licensed by the Board of Psychology, provided that any such individual makes progress toward completing the requirements for full licensure as a school psychologist during such period of employment.

P. Each local school board shall provide those support services that are necessary for the efficientand cost-effective operation and maintenance of its public schools.

275 For the purposes of this title, unless the context otherwise requires, "support services positions"276 shall include the following:

277 1. Executive policy and leadership positions, including school board members, superintendents278 and assistant superintendents;

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2. Fiscal and human resources positions, including fiscal and audit operations;

3. Student support positions, including (i) social work administrative positions not included in
subsection O; (ii) school counselor administrative positions not included in subdivision H 4; (iii)
homebound administrative positions supporting instruction; (iv) attendance support positions related to
truancy and dropout prevention; and (v) health and behavioral administrative positions not included in
subsection O;

4. Instructional personnel support, including professional development positions and library and
media positions not included in subdivision H 3;

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5. Technology professional positions not included in subsection J;

288 6. Operation and maintenance positions, including facilities; pupil transportation positions;
289 operation and maintenance professional and service positions; and security service, trade, and laborer
290 positions;

291 7. Technical and clerical positions for fiscal and human resources, student support, instructional292 personnel support, operation and maintenance, administration, and technology; and

293 8. School-based clerical personnel in elementary schools; part-time to 299 students, one full-time294 at 300 students; clerical personnel in middle schools; one full-time and one additional full-time for each

600 students beyond 200 students and one full-time for the library at 750 students; clerical personnel in high schools; one full-time and one additional full-time for each 600 students beyond 200 students and one full-time for the library at 750 students. Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of school-based clerical personnel to meet this staffing requirement may assign the clerical personnel to schools within the division according to the area of greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle, or secondary.

301 Pursuant to the appropriation act, support services shall be funded from basic school aid.

302 School divisions may use the state and local funds for support services to provide additional303 instructional services.

Q. Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, when determining the assignment of
 instructional and other licensed personnel in subsections C through J, a local school board shall not be
 required to include full-time students of approved virtual school programs.

307 R. There is hereby established the At-Risk Program for the purpose of supporting programs and 308 services for students who are educationally at risk, including prevention, intervention, or remediation 309 activities required pursuant to Standard 1 (§ 22.1-253.13:1); teacher recruitment programs and incentives; 310 Dropout Prevention; community and school-based truancy officer programs; Advancement Via Individual 311 Determination (AVID); Project Discovery; programs for English language learners; the hiring of 312 additional school counselors, testing coordinators, and licensed behavior analysts; and programs relating 313 to increasing the success of disadvantaged students in completing a high school degree and providing 314 opportunities to encourage further education and training. A portion of the state funding provided for the 315 At-Risk Program shall be allocated to school divisions on a flat per-student percentage rate set out in the 316 general appropriation act and a portion of such funding shall be allocated to school divisions on a variable 317 rate set out in the general appropriation act based on the concentration of poverty in the school division.

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§ 22.1-299.2. National Board Certification Incentive Reward Program and Fund.

A. From such funds as may be appropriated for such purpose and from such gifts, donations, grants,
 bequests, and other funds as may be received on its behalf, there is hereby established the National-Teacher
 Board Certification Incentive Reward Program (the "Program"), to be administered by the Board-of

322 Education, and a special nonreverting fund within the state treasury known as the National-Teacher Board
323 Certification Incentive Reward Program Fund (the "Fund"). The Fund shall be established on the books
324 of the Comptroller, and any moneys remaining in the Fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to
325 the general fund but shall remain in the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall remain in the Fund and
326 be credited to it.

327 The State Treasurer shall manage the Fund, subject to the authority of the Board-of Education to 328 provide for its disbursement. The Fund shall be disbursed to award incentive grants to public school 329 teachers obtaining staff who have obtained national certification from the National Board for Professional 330 Teaching Standards or who are candidates for initial national certification or maintenance of national 331 certification (MOC) from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards to assist with the 332 upfront costs of obtaining or maintaining such certification.

333 To the extent funds are available in the Fund, teachers B. Any candidate (i) working in a Title 1 334 school or a school eligible for participation in the Community Eligibility Provision pursuant to § 22.1-335 207.4:1 and (ii) who is pursuing initial national certification from the National Board for Professional 336 Teaching Standards is eligible to apply to the Department for an incentive grant from the Fund pursuant 337 to the Program to cover (i) half of the total initial national certification fee, equal to the sum of the cost of 338 four components and the registration fee for initial national certification, to be disbursed upon initial 339 registration for such certification and (ii) the remaining half of such total initial national certification fee 340 to be disbursed upon successful achievement of initial national certification as verified by the National 341 Board for Professional Teaching Standards. 342 C. Any candidate (i) working in a Title 1 school or a school eligible for participation in the 343 Community Eligibility Provision pursuant to § 22.1-207.4:1 and (ii) who is pursuing MOC from the

344 National Board for Professional Teaching Standards is eligible to apply to the Department for an incentive

345 grant from the Fund pursuant to the Program to cover the total MOC fee, equal to the sum of the cost of

346 MOC and the registration fee for MOC, to be disbursed upon successful completion of the MOC process

347 <u>as verified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.</u>

348 D. Any public school staff member who-obtain has obtained national certification from the 349 National Board for Professional Teaching Standards shall receive an initial state funded from the Fund 350 pursuant to the Program an initial incentive grant award of \$5,000 and a subsequent award of \$2,500 each 351 vear for the life of the certificate. Such annual incentive grant awards shall continue to be paid upon 352 renewal maintenance of the certificate. The Board shall establish procedures for determining amounts of 353 awards if the moneys in the Fund are not sufficient to award each eligible teacher the appropriate award 354 amount. 355 B.-E. The Board may issue guidelines governing the Program as it deems necessary and 356 appropriate. 357 § 51.1-617. Definitions. 358 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning: 359 "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Retirement System. 360 "Eligible employee" means any turnaround specialist or member of the middle school teacher 361 corps providing services for a participating public school division pursuant to subsections D and E and F 362 of § 22.1-199.1. 363 "Participating employer" means any local public school board that offers and pays the costs of 364 improved retirement benefits as described in subsections D and E and F of § 22.1-199.1. 365 "Plan" means the defined contribution plan established pursuant to this chapter and the provisions 366 of § 401 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. 367 "Oualified participant" means an eligible employee of a participating employer. 368 2. That to begin to address the recommendations of the Joint Legislative Audit and Review 369 Commission's 2023 review of Virginia's K-12 Funding Formula, the Virginia Department of 370 Education shall develop and implement a data collection process related to English language learner 371 expenditures and student English proficiency levels and identify other options to support English 372 language learners. The Department shall provide a status report to the Joint Subcommittee on 373 Elementary and Secondary Funding on its implementation and data collection efforts by September 374 1, 2024. 14

3. That the Department of Education, in collaboration with the Department of Behavioral Health 375 376 and Developmental Services or any other relevant stakeholders with expertise in special education 377 as the Department of Education deems appropriate, shall develop a plan for revised special 378 education staffing requirements that addresses the staffing needs of each special education program 379 in each school division as determined by the specific educational and behavioral support needs of 380 students who receive special education and aims to improve special education teacher recruitment 381 and retention. The Department of Education shall report its findings to the Joint Subcommittee on 382 Elementary and Secondary Funding by November 1, 2024.

383 4. That provisions of the first enactment of this act shall be included in the general appropriation384 act beginning July 1, 2026.

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
